### Policy Momentum Nationwide

Over 25 states have classroom cellphone bans, and 77% of U.S. schools already enforce some form of phone policy. Consistent enforcement is becoming a district-wide expectation rather than a classroom-level decision.

### Academic Impact of Phone Restrictions

Schools implementing phone bans have reported a 6.4% improvement in test scores, reinforcing the link between reduced digital distractions and improved academic outcomes.
